DOINGS OF CITY COUNCIL.

Yuma, A. T., June 5, 1901.
Council met pursuant to law. Present: Mayor J. H. Shanssey, Councilmen J. H. Godfrey, J. E. Devine, John Dunne and R. Tapia.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved. On motion all committees on the old cemetery ground are hereby discharged.

Bill of A. Tonini, supplies, allowed, \$4.00. Bill of E. Fleitz, carpenter work, allowed, \$1.75. Bill of Yuma Lumber Company, supplies, allowed, \$2.50.

On motion the recorder is hereby ordered to notify F. L. Ewing that this council will stand responsible for the pay of stakes to be furnished the city surveyor for cemetery lots.

Upon motion the recorder is instructed to collect \$25.00 for every lot on cemetery ground, to be paid upon the issuing of burial permit.

Upon motion a committee of two was appointed to confer with county supervisors in the matter of the amount due this city by the county for purchase of burying ground for county paupers. The Mayor appointed J. E. Devine and John Dunne as such committee.

Upon motion it is ordered that the Mayor appoint a committee of three to audit all city bills and report at every meeting. The Mayor appointed J. E. Devine, J. H. Godfrey and John Dunne.

Upon motion the Mayor is authorized to appoint a committee of three to confer with Capt. A. B. Smith, in the matter of his application for a street railway franchise. The Mayor appointed councilmen Godfrey, Tapia and Dunne.

Upon motion the recorder is instructed to give notice through city marshals to all persons whose property is connected with the sewer, to pay their assessments due within 20 days, and upon their failure so to do, to be disconnected therefrom.

Upon motion the marshal is instructed to serve notice on all persons having property on the streets to remove the same to line of streets within 20 days from date of notice.

Bill of R. Tapia, assisting city surveyor, allowed, \$5.00.

Motion to reconsider the resolution referring to the percentage of marshal for collection of city moneys was carried.

Upon motion the council resolved itself into a committee of one for the purpose of revising all revenue ordinances.

There being no further business, council adjourned subject to call of the Mayor.

A motion prevailed that the appointment of principal be deferred until the next meeting of the board.
The clerk reported that all applications for teachers' appointments were before the board for consideration.

Trustee Miles suggested that the names of three applicants be selected from those on file, and voted upon. The suggestion was adopted and Trustee Polhamus moved that Mary E. Post be selected as teacher of the primary department, and Nellie M. Lyons and Miss Kent be selected as teachers of the other departments, each at a salary of \$70 per month, with no contracts as to the length of term. The motion was seconded by Trustee Miles. The motion carried, Trustees Polhamus and Miles voting aye and Trustee Godfrey voting no.

Trustee Godfrey stated as a reason for his vote, that he did not endorse the appointment of teachers in a bunch; that each application should come up in its regular order; that the present mode adopted by the board was an injustice to others who had applications before the board, and insisted that his vote be recorded in the negative, with this explanation of the same, in the minutes of this meeting.

There being no other business before the board, the meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the clerk.
