## Voyaging by Water Through a Desert Country.

The following letter was received this morning from Mr. Amos Adams, one of the two men who are making the trip from Grabam county to the Gulf of Mexico by boat and who passed through the Salt River valley about a week ago:

GILL BEND, Fab. 23.

Editor Herald, - In terms of my promise to write I wish to say that we found nothing unusual on our voyage down the Salt and Gila rivers except that ducks were plentiful and that Evans ate so much of them that be "quacks" now instead of talks. That of course is strange, in fact phenomena', as all will testify who knows him. On entering or passing through the range of mountains that the river outs, called the Estrella or Gila Bend, we got into a mineral zone, judging from the looks of the country rooks, which is a granit formation, and, believe that in them there is a good field for a prospector.

We have arrived at the Wolfley dam and find about 600 feet washed away, with no sign of any one repairing it. But below saw that a number of men and teams were at work on another dam, the work being pushed by Toohey & George. We found plenty of been and a cave of honey. Oh! we are sweet, I flip Jacks and honey.

We are at the Southern Pacific pumptng station, four miles from Gila Bend We are passing through a fine country, which is adapted to agricultural purposes and are surprised at the evidences of thrift and enterprise to be seen as we sail along, of the ranchers that have setiled along the river.
