tory, or wholly in a territory." This section of his bill would meet with great opposition from the Montana delegation, and in the senate this opposition will be strong enough to cause a modification in the language of the measure.

The proposed irrigation enterprise on the California and Nevada line permits of the construction of several reservoirs, costing perhaps \$100,000 apiece, the land to be reclaimed being open to settlement as the storage capacity is increased. This work is looked upon by the geological survey as the best place in the United States to demonstrate the feasibility of water storage by the government. There would be no conflicting water claims, and all of the land to be watered now belongs to the government and can be reserved from settlement until a particular time.

Much has been written of the proposed dam across the Gila river, where the water is needed for the benefit of the Papago, Maricopa and Pima Indians. In addition to supplying the Indian lands with water, about 100,000 acres of government land could be irrigated, and thus the experimental work of reclaiming the public domain for settlement could be demonstrated at the same time the Indians were being saved from becoming dependent ration consumers.

Such a measure as that proposed by Mr. Lacey can be put through the house if made an administrative measure, and it is extremely doubtful whether anything more than is contemplated in the Lacey bill can be accomplished unless, as is possible, the bill be enlarged to admit of the construction of two or three enterprises instead of but one. The irrigationists naturally have their greatest strength in the senate, where each of the arid and semi-arid states controls two members, or a total sufficient to constitute a formidable minority. It was this minority which made so much trouble last winter, and was partially, if not entirely, responsible for the defeat of the river and harbor bill.

The irrigation senators would perhaps not be so willing to accept the bone flung to them by the majority in the shape of one experimental irrigation enterprise, but if it was made plainly evident that no other bill could pass the house, these same senators who are so much concerned in securing an appropriation for the reclamation of the public domain would be forced to concur for fear the session would come to an end without anything being accomplished.

The seventeen members of congress who have been struggling with the question of a general irrigation bill for several weeks past are now apparently in a hopeless muddle. The first draft of the bill was agreed to by all present solely for the purpose of getting something tangible into shape, either to

fight or amend each individual member thought best. As the various meetings are held, however, for the purpose of putting the measure into more business-like shape, the differences of opinion are accentuated to such a degree that no compromise seems possible. The rather interesting situation outlined itself therefore in effect that while the western members are wrangling over what shall be done for their section of the country, the eastern members, not particularly interested locally, have gone to work quietly, decided what is to be done and are setting out to do it. If the Lacey bill or some similar measure becomes a law the west will owe it to the east, and not at all to the direct effort of the western members, except in the general impression their efforts have brought about to the effect that the people want the arid lands reclaimed and that it would be good politics to make a start at the business.
