Mississippi Boat Turns Over And Seven Are Drowned Three Witnesses Are Heard

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH] KEOKUK, Aug. 19.—Seven drowned tonight when the government steamer, Henry Bosse, overturned in a heavy windstorm in the middle of the twenty-foot channel of Seven others, the Mississippi here. Seifert. including Captain escaped.

Those drowned were caught in the cabin of the boat and were unable to get out of the trap with the exception of Hugh Beaver of Quincy and his eight-year-old sister, who freed themselves, but both went under as the rescue boats drew near.

The Henry Bosse was being used in the building of the wing of a dam The boat had started in the river. for the shore when a squall caught her without warning. Captain Selfert was at the wheel and was thrown seventy feet when the cabin parted from the hull. Seifert was badly injured but was picked up clinging to a part of the wreckage.

The others who escaped swam from under the wreckage and held to parts of the wreckage until boats put out from the shore.

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH] SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—Mrs. Maury I. Diggs sat today in the court room where her husband was charged as a white slaver and heard him testify under hostile questions that he had been unfaithful to her with Marsha Warrington in her own bed room and twenty minutes later herself took the witness stand to testify in his behalf. Then the government and defense rested and the government began its arguments to the jury. The case goes to the jury tomorrow.

Three witnesses held the stand today. Maury Diggs occupied the forenoon with his own account of words and deeds and fears that led up to his final flight to Reno with Marsha Warrington accompanied by Drew Caminetti and Lola Norris, their close friends. Caminetti will be prosecuted when the jury makes up its mind about Diggs, regardless of conviction, acquittal or disagreement. The other witnesses were Mrs. Caminetti and Both were questioned Mrs Diggs. briefly, in substance sustaining the sleeplessness, eratic and nervous behavior that characterized their hus-
