Last evening when the party returned the colonel was proudly exhibiting a huge salmon with a body like a family butcher bill and a head like a congressman. Subjected to the scale test the fish was given a rating of seventeen and a quarter pounds and the colonel was given fifteen minutes in which to congratulate himself. Fred Gardner says the fish is a fine thing'to look at and though he lost his life he was an adversary worthy of the colonel's steel. In trying to land the monster the co'onel lost his balance and was pulled into the water. but he hung on to the line and saved himself by a toe bolt until Fred could come to his assistance.

Frequenting Saloons and Disreputable Places. Section 1. It shall be unlawful for Strictly on the European plan. Recomany minor to frequent or loiter around by the day, week or month. Finest any saloon, gambling house or house bar and club rooms in the southwest of ill fame or to purchase any beer, wine, spirituous liquors or other intox-

icating beverage from any such place, and any minor violating the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, or imprisonment in the city jail not less than one day nor more than ten days for each offense, Section 2. It shall be unlawful for

any saloon keeper to sell or permit to be sold to minors any beer, wine, spirituous liquors or other intoxicating beverage, or to permit minors to frequent or loiter around his saloon. It shall be unlawful for the owner of

any gambling device or game of chance to permit minors to patronize the same. Any violation of the provisions of this section shall be punishable by a ne of not less than five (\$5.00) dol4 lars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense, and upon cemer or gambler repeatedly violates this may be revoked by the city council. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to


