Mrs. Leotia Stoney Northam Sued for \$50,000 by a Los Angeles Clerk

There are a good many ways of making money in this world, and a young Los Angeles man has adopted one of the most unusual methods. The following Los Angeles dispatch of September 3rd, in reference to it, is interesting here by reason of the defendant in the case being a well known former resident of Phoenix:

An action was filed in the superior court today by Stanley D. Gilkey against Mrs. Robert J. Northam, formerly Miss Leotia Stoney, to recover \$50,000 for an alleged breach of promise to marry. The defendant, a handsome woman of 29 years, was married to Colonel Northam July 23rd, in San Jose, and is now living with her husband in this city.

Gilkey is 29 years of age and is a clerk in a local men's furnishing goods store. He alleges that he became engaged to Miss Stoney last April, and that an engagement to marry on August 15th of this year was entered into between them. He maintains that the engagement was never broken; that he remained unmarried and relied upon the contract. He claims to have met Miss Stoney last fall. She was then a stenographer in the office of the Los Angeles Herald. They went together through the winter, finally, according to his statement, becoming engaged. All went well until he heard the announcement of her marriage with Colonel Northam, which he says was wholly unexpected.

Colonel Northam and his bride are residing in a fine house at 142 South Grand avenue, recently purchased by Northam, to which place they went after a honeymoon spent at San Diego and other resorts. Colonel Northam is widely known throughout the state as a man of great wealth.

Stories about the delicate "taste" or those who claim to be wine experts are always interesting. Recently we came across one in which Goethe figures. At a small party at the court of Weimar the marshal asked permission to submit a nameless sample of wine. Accordingly a red wine was circulated, tasted and much commended. Several of the company pronounced it Burgundy, but could not agree as to the special vintage or the year. Goethe alone tasted and tasted again, shook his head, and, with a meditative air, set his glass on the table.

"Your excellency appears to be of a different opinion," said the court marshal. "May I ask what name you give to the wine?"

"The wine," said the poet, "is quite unknown to me, but I do not think that it is Burgundy. I should rather consider it a good Jena wine that has been kept for some while in a Madeira cask."

### ARIZONA FRUITS

Their Display Did Good Work at the Buffalo Exposition.

Prof. A. J. McClatchie of the experimental farm, has returned from his eastern visit, having enjoyed a pleasant summer and feeling very much refreshed by the duties that now confront him. His family returned with him and they used up the full value of their sixty-day tickets in sight-seeing. The professor is very enthusiastic over the fine exhibition of Arizona fruits made at the Buffalo exposition, and is entitled to be so, for his display was made largely through his efforts. In referring to it, he said, that for the side of the display it attracted a great deal more attention than he anticipated. It was, of course, very small in comparison to the displays of many of the states, notably California, but it was fresh and striking in the quality of the fruits shown, and there were many features that attracted attention by their excellence. Arizona, for instance, had the only home-grown dates, and Arizona fruits were all labeled 1901, while many of the large state exhibitions were of fruits of the previous season, thus showing the aptitude of Arizona to get to market early. Virginia, for instance, had a fine display of apples, looked at simply as a display, but on inquiry it was soon noted by the general observer that these were but a half dozen varieties; they were the fruits of the preceding season, and there was a bushel of each kind, thus making up in quantity what it may have lacked in quality, and making a very good appearance.

California, he said, had probably a hundred times as much on exhibition as Arizona, but one thing to be taken into consideration is that everybody expected a big exhibit from California, as her fruits have been advertised wherever the English language is spoken, while probably not one visitor in ten had heard of Arizona, while not one in a thousand knew that anything in the horticultural line could be raised in Arizona.

He was surprised at the universal ignorance of eastern people regarding Arizona, and frequently amused at remarks he overheard. A big banner was suspended over the display bearing the magic word "Arizona." Visitors would come along and reading it, remark: "Where is Arizona?" "What state is Arizona in?" or "Is Arizona in Mexico, or where?" and similar questions that sounded very funny to people who have spent years in telling the world about Arizona.

All these questions gave opportunity for a vast amount of explanation, and when it was made and the visitors realized the great distance, the high freight rates, etc., and the fact that the Arizona fruit was second to none of its kind, the best possible impression was made, and Prof. McClatchie felt repaid for his work.

He said that Secretary Wiggins of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, who had charge of the California display, told him that he believed the advertising given the west in Buffalo did more good in proportion to the effort put forth than it did at the World's fair, or than it will do at the St. Louis fair, and his reasons are plausible. At Buffalo the exhibition is all American, and competitive between states, so comparisons are more likely to be drawn. At Chicago everything American was lumped together and compared with foreign exhibits. Between Buffalo and St. Louis there is equally as good reason. Buffalo is in the center of the thickly populated region from which emigration to the west is sought, hence a greater number of visitors are impressionable. At St. Louis a greater proportion of the visitors will come from the east and middle west from whence they have no idea of moving their homes.

Speaking of his own sight-seeing trip Prof. McClatchie said it was his first visit to Washington, and hence there were many things to see and learn. The cause was true of New England, and while at Boston they were the guests of Mr. Dwight B. Hoard, who did everything possible for their comfort and entertainment. Among the many things seen of historical interest he mentioned Concord, Lexington, the Wayside Inn, where Hawthorne lived at times and the stories of which are famous. He also saw the spot where Paul Revere was stopped in his wild ride, as well as dozens of other places notable in American history.

### LEAST GUARDED MONARCH.

The least guarded of the monarchs of Europe is the old king of Denmark. He is said to walk about the streets absolutely unattended. King Humbert, up to the time of his assassination, was just as unprotected, although his successor can hardly be seen as he rides along for the mounted soldiers surrounding him. The Austrian emperor, since the murder of his wife, never goes abroad unattended, although in the habit of doing so before that event. The Russian czar is very jealously guarded, and Germany's emperor likewise is the object of elaborate precautions. King Edward is always watched by private police in an undemonstrative way, and so are his son, the duke of York, and the latter's children.
