## MESA

### CARNEY DEV COMPANY TRANSFERS BUSINESS

Work Taken up by the Carney Mining Co., Which Will Resume Operations at an Early Date.

The directors of the Carney Mining Development Co., which has just concluded some seven hundred feet of tunnel work on the Carney claims, has turned over the business of the old company to the directors and stockholders of the Carney Mining Co. A meeting will be held at the company's office this morning to take up the work and carry on the business. The new directors are: P. G. Carney, Bert Winger, Jay E. Sexton, Geo. S. Fravin, of Mesa, and Dr. C. P. Norman, J. C. Devine and C. A. Anderson of Ray, Arizona.

Plans for the future will be outlined by the board, subject to approval by the stockholders and it is hoped that at an early date a large force of men will be employed on the property. The engineers have concluded the survey for United States' patent, covering twenty-one full claims. This group covers one of the strongest ledges of copper and gold ore in the state. The development work consists of several shafts on the vein, a crosscut tunnel 600 feet in length, sixty feet of drifting on an are vein, and some three hundred feet of tunneling in three other places on the grounds. A very large vein of low grade ore has been exposed and several smaller veins of ore that carries pay. In some of the workings copper values predominate, in other gold. Experienced mining men all pronounce the property one of the big propositions of the state.
