RAILROAD MATTERS.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 19.—Presidents morning says there is no doubt that efforts are being made for the consolidation of the Union and Central Pacific Railroad Companies.

NEW MAIL ROUTES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Post-Office Department to-day issued an order for the establishment of new mail routes as follows: In New Mexico, from Hillsboro to Lake Valley, in Arizona, from Crittenden to Greaterville, Tucson to Oro, Gillett to Overton, McDowell to Reno, Globe to Turner and Globe to Wheatfields.

POLITICAL COMPLICATION.

NEW YORK, November 22.—Gov. Williams' death causes a new Senatorial complication in Indiana and threatens to leave the state without a head, and prevent the election of U. S. Senator. The law requires that before either Governor or Lieutenant Governor can take his seat, two houses must be organized. The Senate is tied and while Gray was Lieutenant-Governor he had the casting vote as he had two years ago, but the death of Williams leaves tie to be broken by defection from one side or other. The Democrats have determined heretofore to organize safe and will cling to their determination. If each side stands firm the Senate cannot organize, and without it neither Governor nor Lieutenant-Governor can take his seat. At the same time the constitution ends the office of Acting Governor on the second Monday of January. If the two sides of the Senate lock horns and remain in that attitude the state can be kept indefinitely without a Governor.

GRANT ITEMS.

NEW YORK, November 22.—Washington Special says: Several Grant Senators and New York Republicans involuntarily admit that Conkling intends to present Grant's name for Kernan's seat in Senate, and also intends to have him elected for this purpose. Grant has lost his vote in Geneva.

HAYES NOT A CANDIDATE.

TOLEDO, O., November 22.—It is thoughtly stated that President Hayes will certainly not be a candidate for U. S. Senator from this state and would not accept the place, but strongly favors Sherman for the Senate.

DEATH OF MORA MORS.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 22.—Mora Moss died yesterday at Oakland, aged 73.

Garfield Hance is the name of a Yavapai county boy. He was born November 6th.

Tombstone is to have a prize fight. The parties are named Johnny Lamson and Harry Anderson.

The Southern Pacific Railway of Arizona has been leased to the Central Pacific R. R. for five years.

The Camp Thomas reservation will be enlarged. This will cause the removal of the town of Moxey.

The argument in the Peck case in Prescott Friday afternoon, and H. H. Honor, Judge French, has the matter under advisement.

The Arizona concentration camp may own 3000 acres of placers in Pima county. The dirt averages \$3 per ton and is dry washed.

The Southern Pacific Railroad have raised the wages of their employees from \$100 to \$110 per month; freight conductors from \$85 to \$100 and brakemen from \$70 to \$80.

Mr. Jaeger informs the Sentinel that the weather in Yuma is cooling over that it has been at this time of year since 1863, ice formed on the thickness of one half an inch on the 13th, and that the thermometer being down below 30.

In a package of fifty thousand dollars, currency, received by Lord & Williams lately at Tucson was a five dollar bill with this inscription printed on the back: "This is the last of sixty thousand dollars my father left me in 1872."

In Yavapai county, Masterson (Deer) is elected to the Council, Wallbridge, Scudman and Brown (Republicans) to the House of Representatives; and in Yuma county, John W. Worthington to the Council and J. F. Knapp and G. W. Norton to the House of Representatives.

The Odd Fellows are organizing in Tucson. Their building will be completed by January 19th, and will be located on the corner of Maiden Lane and Church street, and to be two stories in height, thirty feet frontage on Church street by sixty feet on Maiden Lane.

Professor G. E. Bailey, of Iron City, Montana, is visiting his sister, Mrs. C. E. Brink, of Laguna San Bernardino. The Prof. was, until recently, connected with the University of California at Berkeley, N. Y. Co. After his visit in California he will visit Arizona.

Poor Charley De Larige has passed in his checks and gone to that bourne from whence no traveler returns, leaving a devoted wife and boy besides many friends in Globe to regret his untimely decease. He never left his bed after being confined in a shooting-some months ago, and had suffered a good deal, Charley was one of the pioneers of Arizona, having been in the territory with the California Column in 1852 and had been working at mining and other pursuits ever since. He leaves many friends and an enemy in camp.—Globe Chronicle.
