The winter of 1865 was a very wet one, and in April the wild oats on the plains between the Hassayampa and Salt River were two feet high and headed out.

Death of William Vernon. This morning at six o'clock William Vernon, a highly respectable citizen of this city, breathed his last and closed his eyes upon all things in this world. Mr. Vernon was a native of Washington, D. C., 40 years of age. None knew him but to respect, and there are few of our citizens who preceded him to the celestial shore who had more or warmer friends, than William Vernon, in Prescott.
