

The process of patenting a mining claim should be simplified and the expense lessened. The object of the government is to encourage and silculate the industry of mining, the production of ore contributing to the general welfare of the country. It has no desire to speculate foundations for a speculative or industrial enterprise by patenting his mining claim. Its reward must come from the enterprise when matured into a producer of ores. Therefore, it should be the policy of the government to lessen the expense of obtaining patents to the minimum that the encouragement of ownership may be given the claim holds, who is striving to develop the

CAPT. O'NEIL'S CAREER. Picturesque Life of an Arizona Offi-

cer Killed at Santiago. Capt. William O'Neill, the "Rough Rider" whose life was sacrificed at Santiugo last Friday, was a warm personal friend of M. M. Rice of Los Augeles.

Mr. Rice tells many interesting stories about the gallant officer. "Capt. O'Neill was a man fit to oden? py any position in life," said Mr. Rica yesterday. "He was a loyal friend and a generous opponent. He was born in Ireland about forty years ago, his parents removing to Washington, D. C., when he was a child, whore his father practiced medicine. Young O'Neill learned stenography and printing, and served as a newspaper reporter in Washington until his parents sent him back to Ireland to be educated for the priesthood. When he returned, however, that life did not suit him, so he studied law. He finally drifted wast, and arrived in Arizona in about 1878. at first working at the case in various newspaper offices until he took the position of foreman of the Prescott Miner,

of which Charles Beach was editor. . . . "Later be was appointed court stenographer under Chief Justice French, and then established a paper called "Hoof and Horn," devoted to the catthe interests of Arizona and the Southwert. In 1887 he was elected Probate of the time in which he lived, but a Judge of Yavapai county and served two years, after which he was elected Sheriff of the county, serving one term, during which he ran down and captured the Canyon Diable train robbers, and many other hard characters who menseed the peace and welfere of the country. He was renominated by the Republican party for Sheriff, but re-

fused to run. "O'Neill was then appointed Adjutant-tieneral of the Territory by Gov. Wolfley. He resigned that office, however to accept the position of president of the Arizona World's Fair Commission, to which he was appointed by, Gov. Irwin. Four years ago he was numinated by the Populists for Territorial delegate to Congress, receiving, his first official defeat, being second on the list of three candidates.
