## Reward Proclamation.

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. To all to whom these presents may come, greeting:-It having come to my knowledge, that on the morning of November second, that Glenn Reynolds, Sheriff of Gila County, and W. A. Holmes, acting as deputy, or guard to said Sheriff, while en route from River-side to Florence, in Pinal County, and while traveling the public highway, and in the line of duty, as such Sheriff and Guard, having in their custody, several prisoners, mostly Indians, whom they were conveying to the Territorial prison, at Yuma, were overpowered, assaulted, and murdered, by these Indian prisoners, and that said Indians thereupon fled, and

made their escape, and are now at liberty. Now, therefore, I, Lewis Wolfley, Governor of Arizona, by virtue of the power within me vested, do hereby offer and proclaim, a reward of FIVE HUNDRED [500] DCLLARS, to be paid by the Territory of Arizona, upon the conviction of Indians, of the aforesaid crime, or crimes, if captured, and arrested, alive, or upon evidence, duly authenticated, of their having been killed, by any officer, or person, lawfully attempting such capture,
