Mr. Spaulding arrived here at 2:40 this afternoon with the body of his son and cleared up the mystery of his as-sassination. He was killed by George Wallen, a young man whom Spaulding considered one of his warmest friends.

Four weeks ago the two young men were supernumeraries in a week's en-gagement at the Metropolitan opera house with one of the traveling troupes. From that time the two young men were together almost constantly. Three or four days ago Wallen coaxed Spaulding to take a trip to Chicago. On Friday Spaulding's father purchased tickets for acting upon orders from the chief start-ed out in citizens' clothes and before 12 gold watch, and accompanied the pair to the evening train.

STATE OF SEIGE IN ARGENTINA. Apprehensions of Rebellion Lead to Strong Measures.

London, April 8.—A dispatch re-ceived here from Buenos Ayres states that a state of siege has been pro-claimed by the government in conse-quence of the threatening state of af-fairs growing out of the political situation. A special dispatch to the Times says: "The minister of the interior has ordered the arrest of everybody who incites the people to rebellion or who raises seditious cries. The minister of war has commanded that two squadrons of cavalry and two batteries of arin preserving order. These measures are slightly reassuring to the public, which had become frightened at the serious aspect of affairs and have alarmed the radical leaders, who are issuing arreads. issuing appeals to their supporters to avoid all ground of offense against the government. 
