Teamsters who came in from Gilson's for provisions, on Thursday, report the roads so soft that teams will not be able to move for two weeks.

James E. Ellison desires to return thanks, through our columns, to the friends who attended his wife and endeavored to alleviate her sufferings in her last illness, and for the many acts of kindness and expressions of sympathy for the great bereavement occasioned by her death.

Since the date of our last publication the Palace saloon has changed ownership. A. E. Love having disposed of the business to A. R. Young. There will be no deterioration in the quality of beverages dispensed, and the resort will, we are sure, retain its well merited popularity. Mr. Love expects to leave within a week or ten days for a visit to Denver, Colo., after which he will decide upon a permanent location, and may conclude to remain a resident of Arizona.

The first San Francisco mail to reach Globe in ten days arrived on Sunday last, and was one of the largest ever received at the Globe office, comprising a great number of letters, and daily papers of six days. Since then several Western mails have come to hand, but with no regularity. The accumulation of mail matter at San Francisco and intermediate points, during the washouts, was so great that the small force of railway mail clerks on the Southern Pacific was unequal to the task of handling it promptly. Unless communication is again suspended, regular service will very soon be re-established.

SAN CARLOS ITEMS.

[Correspondence of the Silver Belt.] The roads are reported in bad condition for travel. The Globe stage arrives on time, but the Thomas stage is generally late.

D. R. Williamson, who is a great lover of horses, at last has obtained a genuine Kentucky thoroughbred, and one of the finest horses in this country.

Mr. Carl Hagen, Hospital Steward, has been granted six months leave of absence. Mr. Hagen will utilize four months of the time by taking a course of lectures at the Medical College at Louisville, Ky.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Dunavan leaves San Carlos on Friday (Jan. 10th) for Tucson, with William B. Robinson private G Company 24th Infantry, a prisoner who is charged with selling whiskey to the Indians.

The Gila River is very high at this place; teams with freight are unable to cross. The rainfall as ascertained from C. W. Ling, observer of signal corps, has been for this month-up to date (9th) more than his records show for January during the past four years.

The trial of the murderers of William Fleming, a soldier of E Troop, 10th Cavalry, who was killed here last summer, is set for Jan. 20th, at Phoenix. Dr. E. M. Mann and a few others are subpoenaed from here. Most of the witnesses are at Apache, where E Troop is now stationed.

Mr. Carl Hyldahl, Chief Clerk at Agency, has brought his wife down from his ranch near Fort Thomas and is now cozily fixed in his quarters. Mr. Hyldahl was married only a few weeks ago to Mrs. Dominga Elliot, and we wish him and his bride a long and happy life.

An effort is to be made to shorten the distance between San Carlos and Wilcox by constructing a road through Arivaipa canyon which will, it is claimed, cut off about 35 miles, making the distance from Globe to Wilcox one hundred miles—the same as to Tucson. This may be further shortened by making a road over what is now known as the trail, between Globe and San Carlos, that will enable freight teams to pass over it. The Interior Department has been interested in the project, and the assistance of citizens of Wilcox and Globe and other parties who would be benefited, will be enlisted to accomplish the work.

Those who have investigated the matter believe it feasible, and, certainly, it would be of great benefit to Globe, and should receive the support of our business men.

We learn from San Carlos and Riverside that the Gila at those places is not fordable. Hence it is that we may expect a temporary interruption in the supply of coke from Wilcox. The mail due Thursday, via Riverside, arrived in Globe on pack animals. Inasmuch as the Gila is a long stream, taking its rise in New Mexico near the Rio Grande, we can not expect a subsidence of the flood, if the rain was general, for many days, and never having attended a guessing school we will not attempt to fix the date of the arrival of a dove with an olive twig in its bill, as a token of dry land some where. We, however, entertain the belief that it will not be long before the wing of the messenger bird will cleave the ambient air.

The following chaff which was first given wing by some one of the numerous editors of the Territory who seize upon a fabricated rumor, is still swinging round the circle of Territorial papers. Its last appearance (credited to the St. Johns Herald) is in the Florence Alta of the 4th instant: "It is rumored that the widow of Glenn Reynolds, who was murdered by the Apaches while on the way to Yuma, is about to institute proceedings against the Supervisors of Gila County, for not providing her husband with a suitable escort. Such a suit in our opinion, would raise some knotty legal points, which would be hard to decide."

We are indebted to Dr. T. C. Stallo for news of the death of Peter B. Miller, which occurred in San Mesquita, Nicaragua, November 15th, 1889. Dr. Stallo was apprised of Peter's demise by a letter from George Miller, consequently there is no room to doubt the melancholy fact. P. B. Miller was formerly a resident of Globe, a man of great popularity, and filled the offices of Justice of the Peace and County Recorder.

The death of Mrs. James E. Ellison, nee Nannie Horrell, which occurred on Tuesday last, is a source of profound regret to numerous friends and acquaintances, but to none will the void thus occasioned be so keenly felt as in her immediate household and that of her father's family. It may, with truth, be said she was all that could be desired as a wife, mother and daughter.

Reward Proclamation.

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. To all to whom these presents may come, greeting:—It having come to my knowledge, that on the morning of November second, that Glenn Reynolds, Sheriff of Gila County, and W. A. Lightham, acting as deputy, or guard to said Sheriff, while en route from Riverside to Florence, in Pinal County, and while traveling the public highway, and in the line of duty, as such Sheriff and Guard, having in their custody, several prisoners, mostly Indians, whom they were conveying to the Territorial prison, at Yuma, were overpowered, assaulted, and murdered, by the Indian prisoners, and that said Indians, thereupon fled, and made their escape, and are now at liberty.

Now, therefore, I, Lewis Wolfley, Governor of Arizona, by virtue of the power within me vested, do hereby offer and proclaim a reward of FIVE HUNDRED (\$500) DOLLARS, to be paid by the Territory of Arizona, upon the conviction of one, or more, of the above mentioned Indians, of the aforesaid crime, or crimes, if captured, and arrested, alive, or upon their confession, duly authenticated, of their having been killed, by any officer, or person, lawfully attempting such capture, or arrest.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the Capital, this fifth day of November, A. D. 1889. LEWIS WOLFLEY, By the Governor, NATHAN O. MURPHY, Secretary of the Territory.
