THE N. E. A. SESSION Rates to Teachers to the New Jersey Coast. The Republican has received from Principal A. J. Matthews of the Tempe normal school and territorial director for the National Educational Association, some information concerning the coming meeting of the association at Asbury Park, Ocean Grove, N. J., July 3-7. On the subject of railroad rates which is about the most interesting to the majority of the teachers there is the following: "A further concession is granted by the railroads in permitting purchasers of N. E. A. tickets to remain at the seashore until August 31st, by depositing the ticket with the joint agent at Asbury Park not later than July 10th and paying a fee of 50 cents for such extension of limit. "This will enable N. E. A. members and their friends to spend the entire summer or any portion at these famous seaside resorts where life during July and August is one continual round of pleasure. With exceptionally fine railroad service to New York and Philadelphia and other points of interest in the east, at very low rates of fare, one may summer on the coast and make occasional trips where new joys await them. "Those who wish to spend a part of the summer at Asbury Park and Ocean Grove and then visit in New York for a week or two on the way home can do so by having their ticket validated at Asbury Park and depositing it with the joint ticket agent in New York immediately upon arrival. For this a \$1 fee will be charged. "Every railroad system in the country's except California's has agreed to the schedule of reduced rates. "Many of the states are organizing into parties to travel by special trains. Wisconsin will send a train. From Chicago it will go over the Wabash via Detroit and lower Canada to Niagara Falls where the afternoon and evening will be spent. The night run will be made over the West Shore railroad through the cities of Buffalo, Utica, Rochester and Syracuse to Albany. Two hours will be spent there and at 8:30 a. m. the party will take a steamer for an all day's ride down the beautiful and historic Hudson river. Arriving at New York City at 6 p. m. those who desire may stop there at a convenient place to be selected later, and go to Asbury Park by rail or boat at their pleasure. Those who wish to go direct to Asbury Park and make their New York stop on the return trip may do so."
