Rules for the contest will be read by the judges who are: Frank Fogal, Chas. Mullen, Lon Harmon, Timers, Bob Mullen, Price Wickliffe and Ed Murphy. A special excursion train will leave Phoenix today at 12:20 p. m. and return will leave Tempe at 5 p. m.

The turkey shoot will come off in town and the steer contest and riding just west of Tempe, in Poga's field. A heavy bunch of steers, the genuine "snaky" article, has been brought in from the mountains.

It is known as the Ador place and will be in charge of Jack Frazier, the mayor of Fish Creek. W. A. Farish who has been in charge of a small force of men at Mormon Flat has moved to Roosevelt where he will commence work on the Tonto Highline road. The present road which is about twelve miles in length will be submerged when the water gets in the reservoir, hence the necessity of building a road to Roosevelt higher up in the mountains. It is estimated that a considerable length of time will be consumed in the operation as the road is through a very rough country and considerable blasting will be necessary. RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION ARIZONA AND MEXICO

Grant Bros' Nevada Outfit Expected Soon to Resume Work on the A. & C.

James Cashion, who is in charge of Grant Bros' outfit, engaged in the construction of the Randolph lines, returned to the city yesterday for his holidays. He had been working on the Yaqui River road but latterly on what is known as the West Coast road. Both lines are far from complete, there being more than 1,000 miles of construction yet.

Labor is extremely difficult to obtain. The Southern Pacific has agents in almost every state in the United States, looking for men, but the supply is not nearly equal to the demand. Mr. Cashion says that there will shortly be 2,200 Chinamen employed in the work. Mr. Cashion expected the Grant Brothers' outfit which has been engaged on the Santa Fe running into Searchlight, Nev. to arrive in Phoenix soon, possible as early as next Friday, when work will be resumed on the Arizona and California road.

It was discontinued several months ago for want of steel, which had been laid only as far as House's Wells. Orders were in for more, but the mills were far behind hand with their orders. The grading was carried on toward the river and water was hauled to the front from House's. Finally the grade got so far from the wells that the water wagons could haul very little more water to the front than was necessary for the horses on the return trip. It was finally decided by the contractor that it would be better to leave the horses where there was water until the track could be laid so that the water could be brought to the front in a water car.
