THE OUTBREAK BY GOVERNOR

Received in Some Quarters With Surprise

Still Says Mr. F. M. Murphy It Might Have Been Expected.

President F. M. Murphy of the S. F. P. and P., Orleans Longacre, general manager of the properties of the Development Company of America at Poland, and F. P. Craice, arrived in our city late yesterday afternoon on their way to the southern part of the territory. They had arrived at Congress the night before and spent half of yesterday there. They left for the south last night. Mr. Murphy will return north in a few days, but will be in Phoenix again some time after the 21st in company with Mr. E. P. Cheney of Boston, one of the directors of the Santa Fe system and extensively interested in the Development Company of America.

Mr. Murphy was asked what he had to say in regard to the attack made by Governor Kibbey yesterday afternoon upon the corporations of the territory and upon those who had offered for one reason or another, opposition to the instruction of delegates to the national convention. Mr. Murphy replied that he had seen no report of the remarks of the governor. Said he: "I have been told that the governor had taken advantage of the convention to speak in uncompromising terms of corporations. That is rather a surprise to me, though I suppose it should have been expected. The governor would like to have it appear that he controls the political situation and he would like to deliver a delegation to the national convention.

"Being confronted by a very creditable spirit of independence on the part of a majority of the republicans of the territory who claim the right to voice their own sentiments, independent of dictation and manipulation it appears that the governor has lost his head and said things which probably later on he will regret, though maybe not. Personally, I do not feel like taking his public statements and utterances, made under the prevailing influences, as seriously as some do, though I confess that I am somewhat disappointed to find that some people in whom we have allowed ourselves as republicans to repose confidence so far as their integrity, loyalty and political patriotism are concerned, have surrendered to the dictatorial influences that have been so effective, prevalent and damaging throughout the country generally; and to find that they are using as they apparently are, the cheap political intrigues of the demagogues against capital and the corporations to gain a political advantage.

"I feel however, that the republicans of Arizona as a rule, can be trusted and that when it comes to a show down they will be found in their proper places, standing independently for the best interests of the republican party in the territory and representing to the fullest extent of their ability in the national convention that will meet in Chicago, republicanism, unhampered by instructions.

"It is quite natural to expect that the governor would be pleased if he were able to say to President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft, in whom, by the way the republicans of Arizona have the greatest confidence, that he has been able to deliver the goods. But I am inclined to think that when the goods are delivered, regardless of whom they may be delivered to, it will be found that the contribution to the national convention, made by the republican party of Arizona, will represent the true sentiment of the party as such, and not the manipulating influences of federal officials, though such a result may prove very disappointing to those who feel that they have a right to say to the republicans of the territory what is good and proper for them, and as would-be political manipulators, disregarding the rights of citizens of Arizona to do and to think for themselves."

JAMES EDWARD BRITT OUT OF THE GAME

He Received the Licking of His Life at Colma Yesterday.

Colma Arena, San Francisco, April 11.—Packy McFarland, the Chicago lightweight, made short work of Jimmy Britt, this afternoon in the scheduled twenty round contest. Britt was sent to the floor three times in the sixth and last round by a powerful right wallop to the point of the jaw. He took the count of nine twice. After the timekeeper had counted five Britt's father jumped into the ring and waved McFarland away. It was practically a clear knockout. McFarland outclassed Britt from the start to finish. It was easily to be seen early in the contest that the Britt who faced McFarland this afternoon was not the Britt of old. He has deteriorated greatly in every respect. He did not seem able to gauge blows, and was very wild. At times he displayed much weakness in clinches and close range fighting. McFarland on the other hand had remarkable speed. His judgment of distance was infallible and displayed great punching power. McFarland showed also as a wonderful two hand fighter.
