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Eleventh Legislative Assembly.

COUNCIL
Fifth Day.

R. H. Hereford, as Chairman of Council Committee of the Whole, on the disposition of the Governor's Message, reported as to the different committees, which parts of the Message should be referred to; adopted.

Rollins, of Pima, offered a resolution to arrange for the Legislative printing with the Arizona Democrat, and MINER.

Dorrington, of Yuma, moved its adoption. Meade, of Pima, moved to lay the motion on the table.

Parker, of Maricopa, seconded same; carried.

Thomas, of Maricopa, gave notice that at an early day he would introduce bills: to repeal the present registration law and frame a new one; an Act to repeal Section 624, page 508 Compiled Laws; and to repeal Justice Act, page 62, laws of the 10th Legislative Assembly.

Meade, of Pima, Chairman of Committee on Rules, offered report.

Dorrington, of Yuma, moved its adoption; seconded and carried.

Baker, of Maricopa, offered a resolution, that the following committees have clerks: Judiciary, one; Printing, one; Territorial Affairs, Mining, Ways and Means, one; Corporations and Education, one; Memorials, Petitions and Claims, one; adopted.

Fickas, of Pima, offered a concurrent resolution, that arrangements be made with the Democrat, and MINER to print the Journals of both Houses; withdrawn temporarily.

Baker, of Maricopa, moved a reconsideration of the resolution authorizing the appointment of Clerks by the Committees, and offered an amendment, making provisions for seven committee clerks.

Council adjourned till 1 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Council called to order at 1 o'clock p. m. — President Masterson in the Chair. Roll called.

Baker, of Maricopa, moved an adjournment till 10 o'clock Monday morning. Amended by Hereford, of Pima, to 10 o'clock to-morrow. Amended, by Dorrington, of Yuma, to 11 o'clock; amendment withdrawn; first amendment prevailed.

Council adjourned.

HOUSE
House called to order at 10 o'clock. Speaker Kauppin in the Chair. Chaplain Hunt delivered the prayer. [The House does not appear to be afflicted with that amount of Christianity usually enjoyed by legislative bodies in Arizona.]

Reading of minutes of previous day, by Chief Clerk.

McCafferty, of Pima, rose to a question of privilege, stating that his words of yesterday were not correctly reported, and asking that they be correctly incorporated in the minutes.

Woods, of Pima, objected.

Haynes, of Pima, moved the minutes be amended as wished; seconded.

Woods, of Pima, called for the yeas and nays. Vote resulted in favor of the motion. Minutes as amended were read, and declared approved.

John E. Anderson, by a communication from the Governor, was appointed his private Secretary.

Memorials and petitions were presented by Woods, of Pima, and Robb, of Pinal, asking for the division of Pinal and Pima counties.

Haynes, of Pima, as Chairman of Committee on Rules, made his report, adopting the rules of the last Legislature, with some amendments.

Mr. Woods introduced a bill for the creation of a new county to be formed from eastern Pima, to be called Cochise.

Mr. Robb introduced a bill for the creation of a new county to be formed from Pinal, Maricopa and Apache.

Mr. Woods yielded to the request of Mr. Robb, that his bill be recorded as No. 1—Objected to.

Mr. Haynes introduced a resolution that the Chairman of Judiciary Committee be instructed to employ a clerk, pay not to exceed that of chief clerk.

Mr. Haynes offered a resolution that Sergeant-at-Arms employ a janitor—Carried.

Mr. Woods offered a C. C. R. that rules of House, 250 be printed.—Carried.

Mr. Sharp gave notice that he would, at an early day, offer a bill for removal of Capital to Phoenix.

COUNCIL
Sixth Day.

MORNING SESSION.
Council met at 10 a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Roll called. Clerks of committees were sworn. President Masterson called Hon. B. A. Fickas, of Pima, to chair.

Reading of minutes by Chief Clerk.

Their adoption was moved and carried.

Baker, of Maricopa, introduced bills. To provide for manner of presenting claims against Maricopa county. Read for first time by the clerk.

Meade moved to suspend rules and have it read a second time by title and then referred to special committee from Maricopa.

To regulate the practice of surgery, medicine and obstetrics.

Meade moved to suspend rules, read second time by title and referred to Judiciary committee.

To prevent destruction of fish, in Gila, Salt and Verde rivers by explosives.

Meade moved suspension of rules, reading of bill a second time by title, ordered, printed and referred to Judiciary committee.

Dorrington, of Yuma, introduced bill entitled "An act to repeal an act to facilitate

the payment of the debt of Yuma county. Read first time, rules suspended and ordered printed.

Stevens, of Pima, introduced a bill to move capital to Tucson. Read second time and ordered printed.

Baker introduced a bill to move capital to Phoenix, ordered printed.

Dorrington, of Yuma, introduced a bill to provide for taxes of mines and mineral deposits.

Rollins moved suspension of rules, reading second time by title, ordered printed and referred to committee on mines.

Council concurred in House resolution relating to rules.

Council concurred resolution authorizing printing committee to receive bid on legislative printing was adopted.

Concurrent resolution of Council to provide for payment of committee clerks at \$5 per day was adopted. Clerks are paid in Territorial warrants, worth eighty-five cents on the dollar.

To pay clerks at the rate of \$5 per day in money is a fair compensation and the resolution should be amended by making it six in place of five.

Council adjourned till 10 o'clock Monday morning.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Sixth Day.
The House convened at 10 o'clock a. m. Roll called and all the members present. The minutes of the previous day were read and approved. The House then proceeded to its regular business.

Haynes, of Pima, appointed Geo. H. Tucker as Judiciary Clerk.

Mr. Wollenberg, Chairman of Committee on Ways and Means, offered a resolution authorizing the following committees' clerks: Appropriations, Elections, Claims, Education, and Indian Affairs—one; Mines, Mining, Roads, Ferries, etc.—one; Corporations, Public Buildings, and Printing—one; Counties, Agriculture, etc.—one; and of the Chairman be allowed to appoint such clerks; objected to, and referred back.

Mr. Dunbar introduced a bill to repeal Sec. 7, Chap. 69, Compiled Laws, in regard to where sheep can be herded—Referred to Committee on Agriculture.

Mr. Haynes offered a C. C. R. authorizing Governor to employ a messenger during the term, pay same as clerks.

Mr. Brown gave notice that he would, at an early day, introduce a bill for the collection of taxes.

Mr. Haynes offered a resolution that all bills introduced be read and endorsed as having been read the first time.

Mr. Brown introduced a bill to repeal the act giving the Judge of the 3d District \$2,000 extra salary.

Mr. Haynes, of Judiciary Committee, made his report.

Mr. Rodgers, of Pima, offered a bill to repeal the fence law in that portion of Pima County where agricultural lands are watered from the Gila river.

Mr. McCafferty, an able speaker, and one of the most conscientious members of the Eleventh Legislative Assembly, rose to a question of privilege, and defended himself and colleague, Mr. Samaniego, against the unjust and false accusations of the Arizona Democrat. His argument was clear and truthful, and his denunciation of those who had tried to destroy his good name, was quite severe.

Mr. Lurvey, of Pima, offered a bill, in regard to the location of the Capital, asking that it be permanently located at the geographical center of the Territory. Here discussion arose as to what Committee it should be referred to.

Mr. Bolan, of Maricopa, gave notice that he would, on Monday, or at an early day, introduce a bill to legalize certain deeds in Maricopa County.

Adjourned until Monday.

Monday—Seventh Day.
Called to order at 10 o'clock a. m. Calling of the roll. Members all present. Prayer by Chaplain Cox. Reading of minutes by Chief Clerk.

Minutes were approved as read, on motion of Baker, of Maricopa.

Baker offered a petition from citizens of Maricopa asking for the repeal of the Gambling Act, passed by the Tenth Legislative Assembly.

Anderson, of Pinal, took his seat.

Baker, of Maricopa, introduced a bill entitled "An Act to restrict Gambling." This is more liberal than the previous law, the tax being much smaller. Ordered printed, on motion of Rollins, of Pima.

House concurrent resolution No. 3, providing for messenger and private secretary for the Governor, was presented to the Council.

Dorrington, of Yuma, introduced a bill amendatory of an act entitled "An Act to amend Chapter II, Section 127, Compiled Laws," entitled "Proceedings in criminal cases," also Bill No. 11, to amend Sec. 2, Chap. 48, Compiled Laws.

On motion of Hereford, the bill was ordered printed.

Fickas gave notice of bills to amend Sec. 11, Chapter 37, in relation to exceptions of personal property; also to amend Public School Act; also to amend an act in relation to marriages; also to create office of Territorial Mineralogist, Geologist and assayer.

Hereford, of Pima, gave notice that he would at an early day introduce an act to provide for appeal from Recorder's Court.

Cornwall, of Mohave, gave notice of a bill regulating cattle redress in the Territory of Arizona.

Baker gave notice of bills to incorporate the town of Phoenix, to amend Section II, Chapter 37, so as to exempt one water right from execution.

Masterson, of Yavapai, gave notice of a bill for the better securing of mechanics and laborers' liens.

Meade gave notice of a bill to move the county seat of Pima County to Tombstone.

Bill to remove capital to Tucson, read second time and referred to Committee on Territorial Affairs.

Bill to provide for the payment of the debt of Yuma County; referred to Judiciary Committee.

Baker, of Maricopa, moved to postpone the passing of House Resolution No. 3, in relation to Governor's Secretary, until 10:30 a. m. to-morrow.

Council adjourned till 10 o'clock a. m. to-morrow.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
The House was called to order by the Speaker. Prayer by Rev. T. C. Hunt. Roll was called by the Clerk—all present. The minutes of the preceding Saturday were read, with corrections; adopted.

C. C. Resolution was received from the Council to the effect that a resolution had been passed by that body authorizing the printing committee to receive bids for printing for the present Legislature.

A communication from the Governor was received together with the Auditor's report. Referred to committee on Ways and Means.

Mr. Southwick gave notice that he had appointed H. H. Noyes as Clerk of Commission Counties, Agriculture and Libraries.

Mr. Haynes, of the Judiciary Committee, in reference to H. R. No. 3, in regard to gambling, reported the bill back, and asked that it do not pass; and upon motion was referred back to Committee on Judiciary.
