A SALT RIVER SALMON

An Eight Pound Fish Brought to the City Yesterday.

A huge fish head hung in front of the place of business of Plimney & Robinson yesterday. It had been brought in by Elder Roberts the inventor of the Salt river cat fish. But this was not the head of a cat fish but of a Colorado river salmon which was twenty-eight inches in length and weighed eight pounds. It was taken from the Salt river about six miles west of the city and is supposed to be the biggest fish ever caught in the Salt.

It will be remembered that the first cat fish ever caught in the Salt was taken about eight years ago by Brother Roberts, who at that time was supplying the pulpit of the A. M. E. church in the temporary absence of a regular pastor. Brother Roberts made the mistake of eating the fish and then telling about it. At first it was thought that he was joking. There is not much harm in a joke though it is not a very dignified thing for a minister of the gospel to spring a joke and his parishioners thought so. But when he told them that he was in earnest and that he had actually eaten a cat fish found in the Salt the storm broke. Lying was infinitely worse than joking. The spiritual leadership of Brother Roberts ended right there.

But some of the members of the church were inclined to side with him. They were of the more credulous faction. To them a nineteenth century miracle was possible and they were drawn rather more closely to Brother Roberts than they had been before for was he not one to whom the Salt river cat fish had been revealed rather than to more profane eyes.

Frank Shirley was among those of the incredulous faction and he offered Brother Roberts a dollar for every cat fish he could produce. He even extended the offer to any other producer of cat fish. Thus was the incipient cat fish industry stimulated. It was not long before cat fish began to be brought in. In a little while the tide of cat fish threatened to swamp Mr. Shirley out of the proprietorship of the Fashion barber shop and he was compelled to cancel his order for dollar cat fish. The cat fish was here to stay and Brother Roberts was fully vindicated. But he had learned something out of his bitter experience and that is that a fish story without ocular proof is null and void. Hence when yesterday he caught this eight pound salmon he did not go straight way and eat it but put it on the scales in the presence of reliable witnesses and then had the head hung up where it might be seen of all men.

Mr. Roberts said that in the vicinity of the place where this fish was caught he hooked another much larger one. But it got away and he recovered only a remnant of his tackle. He said he believed it would measure four feet but he does not want to be understood that it was actually that long. He believes that something ought to be allowed for the piscatorial excitement under which he was then laboring.

Speaking of fish of the Salt he said that the first ones found were salmon. For years no other kind worth mentioning had been seen in the river. About the time of the appearance of the cat fish the salmon diminished in number and almost disappeared. Now they are coming back and there seem to be fewer catfish than formerly.

Last year Mr. Roberts caught two fish which he believes were sunfish an unheard of resident of these waters. He is not however prepared to say that they were really sunfish. He prefers to investigate this discovery a little further.

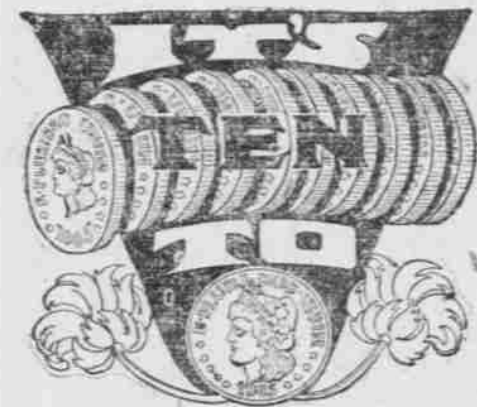

CUTTING TELEPHONE WIRES

The Company Having Much Trouble South of Tempe.

The telephone company has been having a good deal of trouble with its line which runs through the rich agricultural region south of Tempe, and the line men have been kept busy. The line has been frequently cut by farmers in order that the wire may not interfere with the passage of the 35 foot stackers. It is necessary of course to move the stackers but in many instances the line has been unnecessarily cut. In one case it was found that the wire had been cut to allow a stacker to go through and that the same stacker was brought back at a point on the line not more than 150 feet from the place where it had been cut and that it was cut again. The last legislature amended the act in relation to malicious injury to railroads and telegraph lines including in its protection telephone lines. The cutting of a telephone line is therefore a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$25. The telephone company has just caused notices of the statute to be posted in that part of the country. At the same time the company is making changes to facilitate the passage of stackers. At convenient points the wire is elevated so that no stacker need be taken a great distance before a place for its passage may be found. Another improvement by the company is the placing of the wires underground at all road crossings. They are buried in conduits.

VISITED ARIZONA DAM

An Early Morning and a Late Afternoon Drive.
Accepting the invitation of W. R. Cleary of the Arizona Water company, L. C. Hill, R. A. Fowler and Barry Nescher yesterday paid a visit to the Arizona dam. The reasons for the trip were various. Mr. Cleary has a lot of business up there just now in the repairing of the dam. Mr. Goldwater had never been there and desired to take the trip for pleasure and exploration. Nescher, Mr. Fowler and Mr. Hill had been there since the injury to the dam by floods and they wanted to see the exact present day situation. Mr. Hill had arranged for a team from Mesa to meet him so he and Mr. Fowler returned to Mesa early last evening. Mr. Fowler came back to Phoenix and Mr. Hill will leave this morning for Roosevelt. Mr. Fowler though somewhat tired out with a busy day, was seen at the Hotel Adams last evening. He said the trip had been a pleasant one and he enjoyed it notwithstanding the hot weather. The party left here at 10 o'clock in the morning and reached the dam in less than three hours. When they passed Evergreen they noted quite a nice stream of water running in the canal. Though not a large one there was some current and it seemed to be making creditable headway. It will probably be several days before any great quantity of water will get through the ditch. At the headgate they found a head of about 1500 inches of water going into the canal. That is small compared to the needs of the country but the work of repairing the dam has rested at a point where every half day's work should have some effect in raising the water level. About 130 men and forty teams are engaged in the work. Mr. Hill and Mr. Fowler spent some time in watching this enterprise. Mr. Hill giving some suggestions of technical engineering nature designed to help things along. The next few hours were spent in an ocular survey of topographical conditions above the dam, having in mind of course the possibility of the government at an early day building a masonry diversion dam. The preliminary work with this object in view will first be boring for bed rock and determination of conditions for a good foundation for the dam. While such a hasty investigation could not reveal much the building of a permanent dam appears to be entirely practicable. After luncheon Mr. Fowler and Mr. Hill drove back to Mesa, covering that section that after the building of a new diversion dam, will be traversed by the upper reaches of the supply canal for the south side. The trip was designed to be merely an educational one for those who make it and as such it was very successful.
