Arizona Lottery

UNDER THE DIRECTION OF Governor J. C. FREMONT, Territorial Commissioner.

MICHEL GOUDWATER, BANK OF ARIZONA, President, Treasurer.

In accordance with an act of the Legislative Assembly of Arizona Territory, and the Proclamation of the Governor issued thereunder, a

LOTTERY!

Will be drawn at Prescott, A. T., on Wednesday, June 10th, 1879.

Act of the Legislature. An act to aid in the construction of Capital Buildings, and for the support of Public Schools in the Territory of Arizona.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of Arizona Territory: Section 1. It shall be lawful for, and the right, power and authority is hereby granted for the period of twenty years from the 1st day of February 1879, in the Arizona Territory, to the Arizona Development Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and its assigns, to give public lotteries, at which, by means of which money may be lawfully derived of the Territory of Arizona, and its assigns, to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars, to be drawn under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and its assigns, and in a manner to be approved by the Commission.

Section 2. The Governor of the Territory of Arizona, and his successor in office, and in the event of his absence, disqualification or death of the Governor, his legal substitute is hereby authorized to appoint a Commission to superintend the drawing or distribution of prizes, in said lottery, and each of them, and certify to the correctness thereof, etc., etc.

Section 3. All lotteries drawn under the provisions of this act, shall be drawn in some public place to be designated by the Commission, between the hours of ten o'clock a. m. and five o'clock p. m., and in a manner to be approved by the Commission.

Section 4. A sum of five per cent of the collection of ten per cent, from all prizes and the payment of the same into the capital and school funds.

Certificate of Territorial Treasurer. I, Thomas J. Butler, Treasurer of Arizona Territory, hereby certify that the Arizona Development Company has this day filed in my office a prospectus in writing of the act of which the above is a copy, and has also filed in my office a bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, which bond has been approved by the Governor and an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona Territory, conditioned for the faithful performance of the provisions of said act.

Proclamation of the Governor. THOMAS J. BUTLER, Governor of Arizona, do hereby certify that the Arizona Development Company has this day filed in my office a prospectus in writing of the act of which the above is a copy, and has also filed in my office a bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, which bond has been approved by the Governor and an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona Territory, conditioned for the faithful performance of the provisions of said act.

THOMAS J. BUTLER, Territorial Treasurer, Prescott, February 29th, 1879.

THE MANNER OF DISTRIBUTION WILL BE AS FOLLOWS: Twelve thousand slips of leather numbered from one to twelve thousand will be publicly exposed in a large glass case, which will then be closed and sealed by the Territorial Lottery Commissioner. Two hundred and eighty-two slips of leather numbered in accordance with the prize announced, will be publicly deposited in a small glass case, which will also be closed and sealed by the Territorial Lottery Commissioner.

A committee of seven citizens will be selected by the ticket holders to examine every stage of the process.

Both tickets will then be received in sight of the audience, and their numbers are read and thoroughly ascertained. The seals will then be broken and the whole opened, and TWO CHILDREN EMPLOYED BY THE TERRITORIAL LOTTERY COMMISSIONER, will be placed, one of each ticket, and a prize and a number drawn at the same time. The tickets will then be sealed and preserved, and another number and prize drawn, and the process repeated until the 292 prizes are all drawn.

The holders of tickets bearing corresponding numbers will be entitled to the prizes drawn.

Only 12,000 Tickets Will be Sold. Whole Tickets \$5. Halves, \$2.50. Quarters, \$1.25.

The Bank of Arizona will act as Treasurer, and all moneys received from sales of tickets will be deposited there, to await the drawing. Prizes will be paid ten days after the drawing.

All orders for tickets must be accompanied by the money, which can be sent by Draft on San Francisco, Certificate of Deposit or Postal Money Order, or by Wells, Fargo & Co's Express.
