A RAILROAD SURVEY**

**Douglas Capitalists Are New Route Being
Interested In
Project
Out in Eastern
Arizona**

A dispatch from Douglas says that a railroad from Rodeo to Paradise is to connect that rich mining camp with the outside world. That is the latest in new railroads. It has been known for some time that a road was contemplated from either the Southwestern to the camp, or from San Simon station on the Southern Pacific, but there is authority for stating that both lines will be built, and will be the same road. It is to be constructed by private individuals, and Douglas capitalists are interested in the road.

Articles of incorporation are being drafted by the law firm of Richardson and Lockwood of Douglas, and de-
