Mrs. J. J. Backman has recently received a letter from her sister in Kansas, saying that her family and others, in all making up a train of fifteen wagons, were to start for Arizona April 15th.

Last Saturday night a man struck another over the head with a pistol, two men had a rough and tumble fight on the street, in which one got part of his right eye cut off and a muscard roof over his right eye, and the performance wound up by a man beating a woman frantically, (with a bottle it is said), so that she was obliged to call medical aid, and for a day or two lay in a very critical condition.

The troubles in Chino valley, which have existed for two years past, have broken out again about the use of water for irrigation. The case has got into court, and on Wednesday and Thursday was before Justice Otis. Nearly all the male population of the valley was in town as principals or witnesses.

Four of J. R. Porter's ox-teams loaded with 40,000 pounds of flour at Helling's & Co.'s flour depot, on Thursday, for the Indians on the Verde reservation.

J. B. MARIOS, editor of the MINER, started on his spring travels last Saturday, April 20th, leaving a proxy in his sanctum, who is liable to perpetrate sins of omission and of commission in the columns of the MINER, for which MARIOS should not be held responsible.

Geo. Jackson and A. Cullumber, from Walnut Grove, reached Prescott on Wednesday with a load of fine onions, which sold readily at ten cents per pound. They report that Mr. J. Lambertson is quite sick, the principal cause being a wound in his side received from Indians some three years ago.

Win. McCloud got to town Thursday morning with two horses, and two deer packed on each horse. He killed the game on the ridge south of town. Venison is from 15 to 20 cents per pound.

John Barton, J. Smart, Doc. Tompkins and others, started on Thursday for the Diamond fields near Fort Defiance.

Within a few days Messrs. Haslam, Stevens, Clements, Kingsford, Perkins, Snyder and Martin, from Pioche, Nevada, via Wallapai district arrived in town. Some of the party are old Arizonans, the others come to look at our mines.

The mail contractors between Prescott and Hardyville have put carriages on the track, and are prepared to carry passengers and express matter over the road to Chloride, Mineral Park, Cortland, Beale Springs, Camp Hualapai and Williamson Valley. The fare from Prescott to Hardyville is \$30, currency. After this date the mail will leave Prescott Friday evening.

The lots is from 6 to 15 feet wide and has been traced and located for six miles, and is called the Hope. The assays were: \$3,330.28; \$3,443.96; \$13,490.77; \$358.25; \$1,012.60; \$1,044.62. The ore is argenteiferous galena and contains 15 per cent lead.

Indian Items. We learn that since Sunday, the 27th ult., more than 200 Indians have left the Date Creek reservation. The removal of all the Indians from Date Creek to the Verde reservation, had been determined on, and many of them refused to go. Their removal was to commence May 1st, and Jemasie and his band killed. It is conjectured that they may have gone to the Colorado reservation, where some of them have had a residence before. Some of these high-toned Apache-Mohaves say they will fight before they will go to the Verde. Let them sail in; the quicker they make a fight the sooner we shall get rid of the wretches, and it makes no difference where they are from. Some of them are sure to break out from any reservation they may go to, sooner or later.

Just as we go to press, an officer from Fort Whipple informs us that the Indians, to the number of 400 to 450, started quietly on Thursday for the Verde reservation. Lieut. Schuyler, with a detachment of 25 men, is escorting the party. Some of Jemasie's band had returned and are with the party. About 100 are supposed to be in the mountains, and as Capt. McGregor is in that section with his company, the Indians will be likely to see trouble unless they keep quiet.

MARICOPA COUNTY.

(CORRESPONDENCE OF THE ARIZONA MINER.) PHOENIX, Maricopa County, Arizona, April 25th, 1873.

The Grand Jury, which was in session the whole of last week, reported on Saturday, and was discharged. The District Court then adjourned till next Monday to give the District Attorney time to procure a witness in the Griffin murder case. T. C. Hayes immediately started after the witness and found him, but discovering that he just knew nothing, he returned without him.

The Indians. Are still a source of much annoyance. J. Bauerlein and H. Wickenburg, who went out prospecting last week, the one on horseback and the other with a wagon, prepared to stay in the mountains for some time and make a good search, got as far as the White Tank mountains when the Apaches got after them and they left in double quick time, glad to escape with their scalps.

On Sunday morning, while J. M. Heavis and his men were eating breakfast, Heavis lives six miles above McDowell four Apaches stole eight miles from within 400 yards from where the men were eating. Reavis immediately reported at McDowell, and Lieut. Hayes dispatched a force after the renegades, who succeeded in recapturing six of the animals.

On Saturday night, eight Apaches stampeded all the cattle from the post butcher's corral at McDowell, but failed to get away with any, as the cattle were badly scared and the troops were immediately on hand.

When Major Brown, the gallant Apache fighter, was at McDowell last week the citizens there congratulated him on the brilliant manner in which he had fought the Indians. To which he replied, that any success which he and his followers had was entirely owing to a faithful carrying out of the able instructions of Gen. Crook, to whom all praise rightly belonged.

Report of the Grand Jury. To the Hon. Chas. A. Tweed, District Judge of the Third Judicial District, Arizona, in and for the County of Maricopa.

Your grand jury having carefully investigated all matters brought before them by the District Attorney, and diligently inquired into all other charges brought to their notice involving a probable violation of the laws of the Territory, beg leave to report,

That they have found five true bills, four for murder and one for accessory to murder after the fact.

That they have examined the books of the Treasurer, Recorder and Sheriff and find them kept in a style alike creditable to the country and to the respective officials.

That they likewise examined the records of Justices M. P. Griffin and E. Ervine and find them correctly kept in a neat and orderly manner.

That they have visited the County jail and find the wants of the prisoners administered to in a becoming manner. The jail is insecure and badly ventilated.

That to warrant the safe keeping of the prisoners, they recommend that there be placed around the same, a day and night watch, sufficient to insure their safe detention and that the Board of Supervisors allow a compensation sufficient to secure the services of competent men.

Your Grand Jury having faithfully discharged their duties and having no other business before them, beg leave to tender this as their final report and ask to be discharged. J. A. PARKER, Foreman, BOR.

No VACANCY CREATED.—The lamented death of General Canby has already induced speculation as to who will be his successor. There will be no one appointed, as there are still six Brigadier-Generals left, and no promotions to that rank will be made until the number falls below six. Sections 7 and 8 of the Act of July, 1870, provides that no appointment to the grade of Major-General and Brigadier-General shall be made until the number of the former shall be reduced below three, and of the latter below six. The deaths of Generals Halleck and Meade, reduced the number of Major-Generals to two, and Brigadier-General McDowell was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Meade. The death of General Canby does not create a vacancy, the number of Brigadier-Generals still being six.—[Exchange.]
